Case Studies

Child A is a 15-year-old boy in Year 10 with a diagnosis of ADHD. He is very vulnerable to exploitation and involvement in gang activity due to the lack of emotional availability of his parents who are involved in substance misuse.

Attendance at the Homework Club has provided a consistent source of support which has helped him to become more emotionally settled. He has also benefitted from a regular hot meal twice a week which is cooked on the premises.

He has started at a new school that meets his additional needs due to his social, emotional, and mental health difficulties (SEMH). **He is engaging well at school** and is receiving support from staff in the form of mentoring and help with his homework.

He is very keen on science subjects and is studying triple science at school. He now has a plan for his future and **would** like to become a marine biologist. He says "The help I have received at Homework Club has helped me with the work I do at school. I know that if I don't understand at school, I will receive the help at Homework Club."

Child, Yr 9 was having difficulties in mainstream schooling, their mother who had registered them to the School had advised that they were struggling keeping up with subjects especially in English and feeling unconfident due to falling behind and this was causing behavioural issues at home and school.

The school co-ordinator worked with the child, mother, and tutor to sit down with the child to identify their needs and tailor the support they would receive for the rest of the term, liaising with their mainstream school to align support.

The child was given in-class teaching support with their school work and homework and helped to come out of their shell to feel more confident to ask for help and build on their learning. As the term progressed the child feedback that the support had been a big help and the mother reported seeing a confidence and positive change in the child and their learning.


