









AKADEMI

Bollywood for All

Celebration | Participation | Inspiration

Akademi is a London-based, pioneering South Asian dance charity that works to encourage excellence in the practice and appreciation of South Asian dance within a contemporary, artistic, social and educational context in the UK.

For 6 weeks, adults from Milman Street Resource Centre and young people from Bedford House participated in a series of Bollywood workshops, with dance artist, Archita Kumar. The two groups came together to create an intergenerational Bollywood piece, which was performed to a live audience in amazing surroundings at Senate House as well as streamed to an audience of 1500.

The project was a celebration of dance, Indian culture and diversity.



ARDHMERIA

Celebrating International Children's Day

Community | Culture | Celebration

Ardhmeria celebrates the Albanian community in Camden, with a focus on supporting children and young people develop core skills and language.

On International Children's Day Ardhmeria, bought together the community to celebrate children and young people through a mixture of music, entertainment and food.

The event was attended by nearly 700 people.



BWA

Growing Up!


Performance | Creativity | Collaboration

The Growing Up! dance show was created and led by young people from Regents Park Estate and the surrounding areas. The performance covered a range of stories and experiences and explored the daily challenges that they face.

With 50 young people performing, over 20 young people helping back stage, along with 25 volunteers from the local area supporting the project, the production was performed at 8 local community events viewed by close to 800 people.

The project has had a lasting impact with 7 dancers receiving bursaries to attend the Impact Dance Academy, as well as sparking new collaborative projects with The Place and Fitzrovia Youth In Action.







KENTISH TOWN CITY FARM

Pottery Partners

Local | Intergenerational | Cohesion

Strengthening the bond between Kentish Town City Farm and their neighbours, Cressfield Close Sheltered Housing, this project demonstrated the positive impact that intergenerational work can have in local communities. Pottery Partners is a great example of social outreach and inclusion using craft activities.

"Painting invoked lots of memories for the participants, with many painting dinnerware for loved ones, and the joy of creating something you can use provided obvious points for celebrating each other. After each pottery workshop, a hot meal cooked by young volunteers, would be brought to the sheltered housing for everyone to enjoy a meal together. This provided a wonderful end to each session and underlined the focus on creating a community."





Intergenerational Social Clubs

Connection | History | Conversation

Camden is an amazing place to live. It is a hub of innovation, dynamism and excitement. But it is also a community that is constantly changing. These changes can be beneficial, but can often lead to a feeling of disconnection across our wider community. People often don't know their neighbours anymore and the cross generational social interactions that used come from sharing time in community spaces have often been lost.

North London Cares worked in partnership with a number of youth clubs, youth charities, and schools across the borough to host six social; bringing together young Camdeners to share time with their older neighbours. The focus was not on young people volunteering and one-way giving, but providing a community space where these two diverse groups of people would mutually benefit from spending time together. This project has benefitted the wider community by helping to create these community spaces, where young people and older people are given the opportunity to learn about, and from, each other while learning new skills.







ST LUKE'S KENTISH TOWN

Older People's Project

Tackling Isolation | Community | Intergenerational

St Luke's Church ran 3 celebratory events focussing forming social connections. This project created space for a group of over 75 year olds and under 18's to meet, socialise and participate in shared activities.

These events bought the community together, allowed connections are made and friendships forged. SLKT have reported improved community relationships as well as a greater sense of tolerance and understanding.



URBAN OUTDOORS LONDON

Kentish Town Festival

Meaningful collaboration | Knowledge sharing Community cohesion

Collaboration and cultural exchange were at the heart of Urban Outdoor's Kentish Town Festival. Bringing together local schools and community groups this project celebrated Kentish Town's diversity and rich cultural heritage. Over 220 local students directly benefited from participation in creative workshops and the parade itself was attended by more than 1000 residents and visitors.

Central to the project was an exploration of cultural identity through performing arts. By engaging young people, a cross section of the community and by running intergenerational workshops this project facilitated conversations that deepened young people's understanding of difference and made positive efforts to overcome prejudice in the community.



Wac Arts College

WAC ARTS COLLEGE

Creativity | Culture | Community

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Wac Arts College offers a beacon of hope to disengaged young people by using creativity to open the door to learning and solary October 18th from 3-5.30pm development.

Funding was used for a short film project in which students were asked to reflect on the meaning of "Home, Companionship, Memories and Loved -Ones". The students work was premiered on the Big Screen to a community audience.
